Programme Area (and timescale of plan): HIV & AIDS 2007 -2012

Aim of the Programme Area:

To mitigate the impact of HIV&AIDS on poor and disadvantaged people in China

Currently, the programme utilises a mix of specialised International volunteers supported by national Interns. Post 2012, and reflecting the breadth and pace of development within China, HIV prevention initiatives will be integrated within mainstream activities and be supported primarily by utilising skilled national volunteers building upon and expanding strategic national and provincial partnerships developed during the current phase.

Why is VSO working in that particular Programme Area and Region?

HIV & AIDS is an increasing threat to development in China and VSO recognises it has a unique role to play.

The HIV & AIDS epidemic is evolving and becoming increasingly severe. There are growing signs that it is spreading from clusters of high risk behaviour groups to the general population, often due to lack of education plus information and access to HIV & AIDS services. The HIV and AIDS policy (Four Frees and One Care) and its implementation have obvious gaps in poor areas. VSO's core competence of capacity building is complementary to improving the quality of service delivery and to enhance the implementation of government policies within the areas we operate.

National Statistics

Accepted world-wide statistics for China show that by the end of 2009:

- 740,000 (560,000 920,000) estimated number of alive people living with HIV (compared to 500,000 living with HIV in the USA)
- 326,000 reported cases of people living with HIV
- 107,000 were cases of AIDS
- 54,000 reported deaths of which 30.5% were women
- Prevalence among the population as a whole was 0.057% (0.042% 0.071%);
- 48,000 people (41,000 55,000) were newly infected with HIV in 2009

A key note accompanying the statistics is the acknowledgement that "the epidemic has already started to spread from high-risk populations to the general population" and that "sexual transmission continues to be the primary mode of transmission, and homosexual transmission is increasing rapidly" with "the number of people affected by AIDS increasing, and transmission modes diversifying."¹

Key Objectives of the Current Programme and the "cross-cutting"/"mainstreaming" themes (up to 2012):

- 1. Improve quality of HIV services in Yunnan. The poor and or disadvantaged in Yunnan have improved quality of HIV and AIDS prevention, care, support and treatment services. This will be achieved by partnering with local government, NGOs and volunteering involving organisations and building their management and technical capacities to deliver quality HIV services to people affected by HIV and AIDS. It is expected to raise awareness of leaders and the general populace, reducing stigma and discrimination, building individual and institutional capacity in the coordination of HIV responses.
- 2. Mainstreaming: Continue to support partners to mainstream HIV and AIDS prevention activities throughout all VSO Basic Services operations as well as new initiatives from 2012 whilst encouraging increased involvement from people living with HIV and AIDS.

In accordance with VSO International objectives on gender as a cross-cutting theme, initiatives will continue to address the inequalities in power between men and women in China. Also, national volunteering will play a greater involvement in varied forms throughout the programme.

What makes VSO's work in this programme area special?

- VSO enables National Volunteers or Interns to play a key role in programme management and delivery and provides key learning for VSO as it prepares to expand the National Volunteering programme post 2012.
- VSO operates via workshops, study tours and learning opportunities for partner organisations that allow good practice to be shared and improving cooperation among local partners.
- VSO International Volunteers have brought opportunities for partner organisations to learn and share together. A transitional period, as the current phase concludes, ensures this learning is transferred to the national volunteering programme for launch post 2012.
- Initiatives have demonstrated a successful model of community based comprehensive HIV & AIDS prevention, treatment and care interventions with multi-sectors in Yunnan (benefiting 1.2 million people).
- Mainstreaming work has enabled HIV awareness to be raised among a wider group of people: In 2001, VSO China introduced HIV & AIDS as a cross cutting theme within its education programme. By 2004, out of 45 teacher training colleges - 31 were integrating HIV & AIDS activities through their ELT. By 2007, 5 National Volunteer Groups for HIV & AIDS education was established in 5 teacher colleges in 4 provinces.

National Volunteering from 2012

National volunteering holds the key to future successes for VSO activities in China. After the current phase concludes in 2012, people from diverse communities within the country will be offered greater opportunities than ever before to participate in programmes. Programmes that seek to ensure positive change for the most poorest and disadvantaged communities.

The outcomes will not only seek to build upon the successes of the HIV prevention and Education programmes but will also aim to raise the profile of volunteering as a whole and as a force for good.
